Personal Statement: Past and Present Professional Experience:

Sekou Berte has been working in the field of sociocultural anthropology since 1988. Berte worked on various archaeological research projects, often for several month, in inhospitable conditions in Mali with various teams from Rice University, (Texas, Houston), Cambridge University and the Institute of Archaeology (UCL-UK). Moreover, he has been working on collaborative projects in human-geography and socio-ethnology, (Kyoto University) since 1990. Beginning from 1992 to 1994, Berte worked at Operation, Aménagement et Productions Forestières, (OAPF) in the areas of agro-forestry among the satellite communities of the forest reserve of the Mont Mandingues, (Forêt Classée des Monts Mandingues). Berte was a founding member and the administrative officer at Karite Mali, an NGO in Mali. Berte has been active in the area of documentary film industry.

In 1998, Berte was local site manager for BBC, Channel 4. Moreover, in 1997, Berte was the local fixer for Wall to Wall Television. Subsequent to his fieldwork for the requirements of his M.A. in African Archaeology, Berte is developing an analysis on narratives on the past from an ethno-archaeological approach to indigenous Senufo perspectives in Southern Mali. As regards his academic credentials, these are outstanding and he worked as a translator and a research assistant prior to pursuing graduate programs abroad. Of particular relevance to his proposed area of research, he has published a field report⁵. Since September 28th 2007, Sekou Berte is the Manager of a long-term innovative institutional project, Mali Cultural Heritage Agency, (Agence du Patrimoine Culturel du Mali-SARL).

Mali Cultural Heritage Agency is a non-governmental institution that conducts applied research in socio-cultural anthropology, civil engineering and particularly in the area of Cultural Resource Management (CRM) throughout Mali. Currently, Agence du Patrimoine Culturel du Mali-SARL jointly conducted an applied research project in the area of the human geography of cultured tourist practices with OMATHO6. Berte is the project coordinator. Also, Berte was the Director of Mali Exchange7 Study Abroad in Mali. In the areas of ongoing projects and joint scholarship since 2012, we are conducting a joint project that is focusing on kitchen ethnography and Savanna food cultures with the University of Oregon's Food Program8, (Department of International Studies).

Today, Berte is a part time lecturer in Socio-cultural anthropology at the Conservatoire des Arts, Métiers et Multi-Média Balla Fasseke Kouye de Bamako, (CAMM-BF), (School of Arts, Crafts and Multi-Media, Bamako) from 2008 to present. He is lecturing in Ethnomusicolog and teaching General Culture at CAMM-BF. Beginning from the Academic Year 2009-2010, Berte was a member of the faculty at FLASH and Centre d'Enseignement Supérieur de Bamako. Today, Berte is developing a course entitled Heritage, Culture and Economy, (Patrimoine, Culture et Economie). Also, on a keynote, he is currently exploring, developing opportunities and training interests areas wit grassroots communities? and students from the Bamako School of Arts that conduct field-school activities in ethnomusicology in an across our NGO's pilot project areas as of early March 2017 to present. Likewise, subsequent to our 13 COM learning experience, ware networking to bridge and develop sustainable teamwork in the areas of safeguarding intangible cultural heritage in and across Africa, Bhutan and El Salvador with participant colleagues that resided at Hotel Belamy, Port Louis (Republic of Mauritius) in 2018.
